



## SPREADING AWARNESS ON OCEAN CONSERVATION

The Pearl Protectors has prioritized creating a larger awareness of protecting the ocean and the marine environment of Sri Lanka. Our awareness programs focus on highlighting the ecologically rich marine ecosystems of Sri Lanka and the various threats they face due to human activities.

The Pearl Protectors has identified that plastic and microplastic pollution can be significantly reduced through effective large-scale awareness. To increase the impact, our awareness sessions entail practical workshops on methods that reduce single-use plastics such as switching to reusable alternatives. Through both theoretical and practical sessions, we have been able to inspire more individuals to follow a plastic-free lifestyle and to protect our ocean.





## **CELEBRATING WORLD OCEAN DAY ON A** NATIONAL LEVEL

The World Oceans Day 2020 was marked nationally through various initiatives by The Pearl Protectors. We hosted, for the first time, a national online symposium to emphasize threats faced by the marine environment and possible opportunities to conserve. A marine life art exhibition that we launched, once again for the first time, gained over 600 submissions that highlighted the endangered and critically endangered marine life in Sri Lankan waters. A documentary that reveals the polluted seabed of the Western Province was also premiered. The success of celebrating World Oceans Day is certain to have a ripple effect in spreading awareness and inspiring action to protect the ocean while helping progress the initiative for years ahead.

## **INSPIRING THE NEXT GENERATION OF RESEACHERS**

The Pearl Protectors was successful in publishing research case studies and survey reports on issues relating to aquaculture, plastic consumption and on the maritime domain. The research was carried out by enthusiastic volunteer researchers who authored and contributed, together with the support of The Pearl Protectors team. As an initiative under our Advocacy movement, we will continue to further strengthen youth engagement in conducting marine-related research while providing adequate support for national policy decision making.





## **PROMOTING THE CONCEPT OF UPCYCLING**


To promote sustainable consumption, The Pearl Protectors aims to promote upcycling that combines upgrading and recycling plastic waste simultaneously. With Vesak and Christmas being widespread celebrations in Sri Lanka, we continue to invite those who celebrate to upcycle as opposed to purchasing new decorations which would end up in our ocean when discarded. We have recognized creative submissions shared with us to inspire more to join in the movement towards an upcycling culture.

# IMPACTFUL PARTNERSHIP WITH AIESEC

As a youth-led organization, our goals comprise of enhancing youth engagement and representation in conserving the marine environment of Sri Lanka. Through awareness sessions and video campaigns, we have connected with students who took an interest in channeling their voices towards taking the message of individual commitments and the need for systematic changes to the masses.

As a knowledge partner to AIESEC Sri Lanka, we intend to initiate more projects to foster a network of young environmental leaders who can turn the tide.





## ADVOCATING TOWARDS SUSTAINED DEVELOPMENT

Development projects in the coastal zone can have significant negative impacts on sensitive ecosystems if carried out without adequate measures in place to prevent and mitigate any environmental damage. Therefore, The Pearl Protectors continue to advocate for the relevant environmental assessments to be conducted and due process to be adhered to before the commencement of projects that have the potential to cause irreversible damage.

# CREATING A HEALTHIER SHORLINE

While beach cleanups are not the grassroots solution to the plastic crisis at hand, such events assist in assessing the magnitude of the problem. We understand the importance of maintaining a healthier shoreline as it helps to filter the pollutants, protect from erosions and provide habitant for coastal marine life and corals. Clean beaches are also imperative for recreation, tourism and the conservation of endangered marine life that come ashore. For this purpose, we have continued to host beach cleanups and promote short beach cleanups among beachgoers. Engaging with coastal communities through positive interactions has also attributed towards maintaining a healthy coastline.





## **PROMOTING VOLUNTEERISM TO PROTECT OUR OCEAN**

The Pearl Protectors has prioritized promoting volunteerism and recognizing passionate volunteers through all initiations. We have elevated the national recognition of being globally ranked as the leading nation of volunteer participation according to the World Giving Index. Standing at more than 300 registered volunteers, more volunteers are inspired to join hands in protecting the marine environment of Sri Lanka. The Pearl Protectors will continue to further facilitate our volunteers with opportunities and necessary resources to accomplish impactful goals.

# HIGHLIGHTING POLLUTED SEABEDS

Plastic debris accumulates in the seabed's and causes the death of marine fauna when ingested. The benthic community is also threatened by the high concentrations of microplastics. The Pearl Protectors documented and premiered a closer look at this unseen amassing to highlight the need to stop the pollution at the source. The Pearl Protectors took part in a seabed cleanup event where our team members scuba dived and snorkeled in an effort to remove the plastic waste. While identifying the need for more attention on the issue at hand, we will be organizing more cleanups.
